On “Delivering the Goods...”

In the upper room on Easter evening, when Christ told the disciples to wait in Jerusalem until God had “*clothed them with power from on high,*” Jesus also “*opened their minds to understand the Scriptures, and said to them, ‘Thus it is written, that the Christ should suffer and on the third day rise from the dead, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins should be preached in His name to all nations...’*” (Luke 24:45-47).

In the same vein, Paul wrote to the Corinthians, “*For what I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received, that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, that He was buried, that He was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures...*” (1 Corinthians 15:3-4).

The core of apostolic ministry is the preaching of repentance and forgiveness of sins in Jesus’ name.

The matter of first importance is the delivery to others of what we have received – Christ’s death and resurrection for us.

In our family, when talking about sermons, I’ll sometimes ask, “Did the preacher deliver the goods?” In other words, what was the real goal of the sermon? Or you might ask, what did the teacher really have in mind with the religion lesson? Did it clearly deliver what God promises? Or just talk about the Gospel?

You see, I believe that **whatever** the goal of your sermon or lesson, whether it is a “faith goal” (that the hearers/learners might grow in faith) or a life goal (that the hearers might grow in living the Christian life), **nothing good will happen unless you truly “deliver the goods.”**

The Gospel is more than happy talk about Jesus and God. The Gospel is preaching and teaching that actually brings forgiveness of sins, life and salvation in Jesus’ name. It is the death and resurrection of Jesus personally applied to dying sinners.

Where the Law has exposed the cuts and wounds from living in a sinful world, “delivering the goods” means applying the healing medicine of forgiveness in a personal way: “Your sin is forgiven!” Indeed, when the Law has killed us by exposing the fact that sin is not only “out there” but also “in here” – in my heart, my life, my being – “delivering the goods” means bringing to dead ones the living Word of the God who raises the dead. Jesus is alive! In water, in Word, in Body and Blood, He makes you and me alive.

So remember, you are called to speak the Word of Christ, and His Word does what it says. “Peace be with you!” said Jesus (John 20:19), and His Word actually brings peace. “Because I live you will live also” (John 14:19b), Jesus told His disciples. And His promise brings what it says – life! When you have prepared to preach or teach – go back, look it all over and ask, “how do these words bring life, the life of Christ, to my people, my students?”

My fellow colleagues in ministry, think of it! You have the privilege of actually delivering God’s life-giving promises to people when they need it most. You are the delivery person in your pulpit, your classroom, wherever God takes you. **Let every word always serve this goal – to bring life, to “deliver the goods!”**

Christians and the Challenge of Islam

Main Presenter – Dr. Adam Francisco, Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne

Dr. Adam Francisco:

Adam S. Francisco graduated from Concordia University (Irvine, CA) with a M.A. in Theology (2001). Afterwards he moved to England where, in addition to pursuing further research in Christian theology, he studied Arabic and Islamic theology at the Oxford Centre for Islamic Studies. From the University, he earned both a M.St. (2003) and D.Phil. (2006) for his work in the history of Christian-Muslim relations. Dr. Francisco served as Albin Salton Fellow at the University of London from 2004-2005. Afterwards, he taught in the history department of Concordia College (Bronxville, New York) until his recent appointment as a guest professor at Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, IN. He recently published the monograph *Martin Luther and Islam* (E.J. Brill, 2007).

Christians and the Challenge of Islam:

The theology and proliferation of Islam presents a significant challenge to Christians. To provide a foundation from which to consider how it should be regarded and how Muslims might be approached, Dr. Francisco will present a series of three lectures under the title “Christians and the Challenge of Islam.” “The origin and theology of Islam” will set the foundation by honing in on the key ideas and events that have shaped contemporary Islam. “A Lutheran evaluation of Islam” will consider how Christians should regard its theology. Particular attention will be given to the question of whether Islam should be considered a heresy, a sect, or, perhaps alongside Christianity and Judaism, an Abrahamic faith. Lastly, “A Christian approach to Islam and Muslims” will, after considering local demographics, analyze and recommend various approaches to Muslims.

Seminar on Creation & Evolution Offered in Freeburg on May 3

The Discovery and History channels on TV, the Zoo and Science Center in St. Louis, and most biology and geology textbooks assume that the world as we know it evolved over millions of years. **Are science and the Bible at odds with each another?** How can a Christian address questions about evolution and creation in a way that is scientific and also faithful to Scripture?



Dr. David Menton will address these questions and more in a **Creation/ Evolution seminar on Saturday, May 3, 2008, in Freeburg, Illinois.** The seminar, hosted by Christ Our Savior Lutheran Church, begins at 10:00 a.m. and concludes at 4:00 p.m. Lunch is included.

More specifically, Dr. Menton will discuss **“Creation or Evolution: What is the Evidence and Does It Make a Difference?”** Everyone is invited to the seminar, which is geared toward adults and high school youth. There is no charge, but a free will offering will be taken to help cover expenses for the seminar and meal.

Dr. Menton works with **Answers in Genesis**, an organization including scientists like Dr. Menton who show that true science is not at odds with the teachings of the Bible. He is Associate Professor Emeritus of Anatomy at Washington University School of Medicine in St. Louis, MO where he taught from 1966 to 2000. With a Ph.D. in cell biology from Brown University, Dr. Menton received Washington University School of Medicine’s ‘Distinguished Service Teaching Award’ five different years during the 1990s. Among his many awards and honors, he has been profiled for almost two decades in *American Men and Women of Science*. Dr. Menton has lectured extensively on creation and evolution in North America and Ireland.

News Release From Concordia Seminary-St. Louis

Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, together with Peace Officer Ministries, will host “Christian Law Enforcement Chaplaincy – Theology and Practice,” May 19-23, on the Seminary campus. This workshop will offer unique accredited training for chaplains, peace officers and pastors, focusing on effective Christian ministry to and through law enforcement.

The workshop will explore issues such as adopting a sound biblical theology; understanding law enforcement as vocation (God’s calling); distinguishing and properly applying Law and Gospel and God’s Two Kingdoms within a law enforcement context; addressing practical, legal, historical, cultural and missiological considerations, employing Christian stress management and officer spiritual survival strategies; and identifying characteristics of a competent Christian chaplain. The main presenters will be Rev. Steve Lee and Mike Dahmer.

The cost to attend “Law Enforcement Chaplaincy-Theology and Practice” is \$295 and includes four breakfasts, five lunches and two dinners. Housing is not included. A total of 2.7 CEUs are available for full participation.

Lutheran Blind Mission 85 Years and Going Strong!

Lutheran Blind Mission (LBM) this year celebrates the milestone of 85 years of service to blind and visually-impaired people. And how are we doing? The old phrase is true: You are as old as you feel. LBM feels very young and continues to be very active.

Many times people are asked: "What is your secret for longevity?" When we look back over the years, it is clear what our secret has been and continues to be: *God has been leading and guiding the mission's efforts and work.* Each decade of our ministry and service has brought its own challenges, changes, and blessings. That's a pretty good formula and LBM's secret for long life: challenges, changes, and God's blessings.

LBM started with the vision of one man trying to help another man who had lost his vision. The mission today encompasses over 13,000 people. That's right, 13,000 people from donors, to volunteers, to library patrons, to readers of magazines, to people who attend outreach centers. Then, if you consider the thousands of people touched in each decade of service, the total number of people is enormous and mind-boggling.

85 years is a good long time, but we feel young. Planted by God, LBM has flourished, borne fruit in old age, proclaiming, "*The Lord is Upright.*" It has not slowed down but continues to press forward in sharing the Gospel with people who are blind and visually impaired. You have caught the vision in sharing the vision of Christ Crucified and Resurrected.

Thank you for being a part of the mission and ministry of Lutheran Blind Mission. As we make plans for the years that lie ahead, we look to the opportunities and challenges that God lays before us as we go about our mission and ministry of *helping blind and visually-impaired people see Jesus.*
